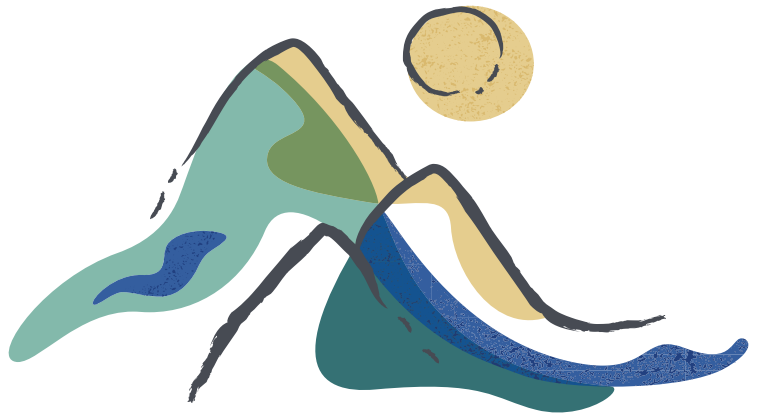


# Legacy Letter Overview

Sharing your values,  
not just valuables



## What is a Legacy Letter?

While many people associate “legacy” and “wealth” with tangible financial assets, a Legacy Letter looks beyond wealth.

A non-legal vehicle for communicating your values, stories, memories, advice, hopes, or core principles to loved ones, a Legacy Letter can be as simple as a handwritten letter or as elaborate as a collection of photos and stories.

Also known as an ethical will, the Legacy Letter concept began over 3,000 years ago as an oral tradition which involved passing down stories about lineage and family history to younger generations.

## Why is it important to leave a Legacy Letter?

A Legacy Letter can leave a lasting impression on family and friends, provide guidance or inspiration for future generations, and help preserve a family’s legacy. It can also provide comfort and joy to your friends and family.

Your letter can be shared with recipients before or after the end of your life.

While a Legacy Letter can be addressed to anyone you want, you can share your thoughts, feelings, and memories without a particular person in mind.

This is a way for you to be remembered and for your legacy to be shared and preserved.

## How do you create a Legacy Letter?

A Legacy Letter can include anything that is important to you. There is no single best way to create one, but here are some tips that might be helpful:

### *Pre-planning*

- Reflect on your life, your values, and personal experiences.
- Decide who the letter should be addressed to, what message you'd like it to convey, and what format (handwritten, typed, video, collage, booklet) you want to use.
- Consider writing letters for various loved ones to be shared at different points in their lives.
- Think about whether you'd like to share your letter during your life or keep it secret until after you are gone. An unexpected message from you could be a treasured gift to loved ones.

### *As you write*

- Once you have a plan, create from the heart. You can edit and review later.
- Find a quiet or meaningful place to write and reflect.
- As you're writing, think about milestones you might miss, favorite family stories, advice you'd like to impart, feelings you'd like to share, hopes you have for a loved one's future.
- Consider what instructions or explanations you might include to help others understand the decisions made in your legal documents.
- The letter doesn't have to be formal—write in your voice, just as you'd speak.

### *After writing*

- Once you've completed your draft, set the letter aside. Take time away from the letter, then reread it. Make changes or additions if you like.
- Store the letter in a safe place that is easily accessible by its recipients when the time comes.

## How do I get started?

Facing a blank page can be daunting, so we encourage you to jot down some thoughts on the Legacy Letter template we've provided.

Don't feel restricted by the template. Be creative. Let the words and thoughts you want to share lead the way.

*You mean more to me than I can say. As I near the end of my life, I want to share some thoughts and stories with you. My hope is that you read them over and over when you’re feeling down, lonely, or adrift—or simply want your mom near.*

*If there’s anything I want to leave for you, it’s wisdom for living a happy life. Here are some of the “tricks” I’ve learned over the years:*

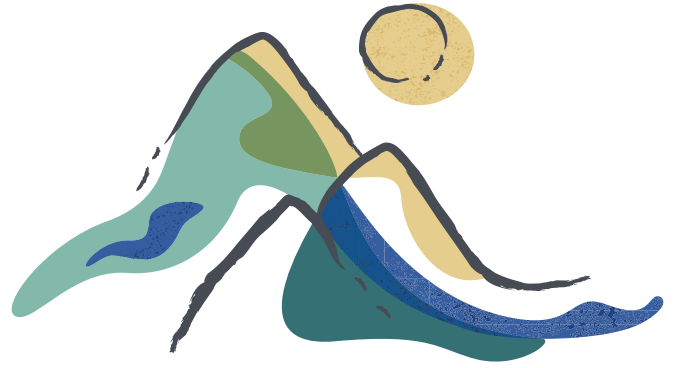
- **Be kind.** Always. People will forget what you say to them but they won’t forget how you made them feel. Be a person who lifts others up.
- **Look for the silver lining.** Remember how I met your father? I rear-ended his Mustang. Boy, was he angry. Somehow, though, we ended up laughing about it—and, well, you know the rest of the story.
- **Be honest.** The truth will always come out. Don’t suffer bad energy, anxiety, or resentment by hiding the truth. Speak from your heart.
- **Eat dessert.** Eat it first, if you like. Dessert (and you know I love sweets) is one of those little joys that make life sweeter. Good wine, too!
- **Be thankful.** Thank people for who they are, for what they do, for how they make a difference. These little words mean so much—and will give you a lift, too.
- **Share love.** Tell people you love them. Be bold. Love is why we are here.

*Now, a quick note on some legal stuff: We’re leaving anything that’s left to each of you equally. There’s a small amount left to charity—you know how important Habitat for Humanity is to us—but the rest is for you to enjoy. You’ll likely inherit your Dad’s IRA, so please talk to a CPA or investment advisor so you make tax-savvy decisions. We appointed your brother Greg as the estate executor—we don’t love him more!—because of his legal experience and geographical proximity. It’s a big responsibility, and we expect him to involve you in any big decisions.*
